

Many Donors to Stablish Foundation set up a Donor Advised Fund (DAF) for the purpose of granting scholarships for K-12 or post-secondary education. Understanding the rules for making scholarships can be complicated, but scholarships can be awarded with careful planning and thought.

The first rule is that the entities to which "grants" can be made must be one of the following:

- Religious Organizations Any religious organization can earn tax exempt status when serving a community;
- Governmental Entities A public purpose must exist if a Donor desires to make a scholarship through a public university or college or even high and elementary schools. Scholarships fulfill this public purpose.
- <u>Public Charities</u> Some public charities provide grants for scholarships.
- International Organizations Although research must be done, some international organizations can qualify to grant scholarships.

The second rule is that a scholarship must be administered by a 501(c)(3) public charity or educational institution. While the Donor and/or members of the Donor's family may participate on the independent selection committee, they may not represent the majority of the committee, nor may they designate a recipient by name.

In order to be assured of the appropriateness of the scholarship grant, Stablish Foundation recommends that the Donor not participate in the selection process. It is also important to note that DAF funds cannot be used to assist the Donor or the Donor's family. Any grant from a DAF is made payable to the approved organization sponsoring the scholarship. The grant <u>cannot</u> be made to an individual.

In order to maintain an "arm's length" scholarship grant process, Stablish Foundation does not participate in the selection process. However, Stablish Foundation does assist the Donor in determining where and how the scholarship can be made.

These are the steps a Donor will go through with Stablish Foundation to create a DAF to grant scholarships:

- The Donor creates a DAF with Stablish Foundation;
- **2** The Donor needs to specifically determine the entity or entities to benefit from the scholarship grants;
- Stablish Foundation then coordinates with the entity or entities to determine its method of selecting recipients of the scholarships. In many cases an entity may have a separate qualified organization to administer the scholarship process;
- The Donor also may determine a department or purpose with the entity to handle the selection process. This is the area where a Donor can uniquely create the purpose and parameters of the qualifications for the scholarship grant; and,
- The Donor should also determine whether he or she wants the grants to remain anonymous or he or she wishes acknowledgement for the gift.

As a creative example, Stablish Foundation had a DAF created at the death of a Donor. Before her death, the Donor provided Stablish Foundation with name of a university where she wanted to create a scholarship fund for a potential student. Stablish Foundation discussed the process with the university and the parameters created by the Donor. Although she was a university professor when she passed away, she was just a C-student in high school and she wanted to encourage students like her to reach higher. Therefore, the primary parameter for a student to receive the university scholarship was having been a C-student in high school. This is just one example of a Donor's creativity in establishing a scholarship program for a unique category of student.

A scholarship DAF created by a Donor with Stablish Foundation can be as unique as the Donor desires as long as the parameters are within the IRS rules for granting scholarships.
